UPCOMING EDUCATIONAL/TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

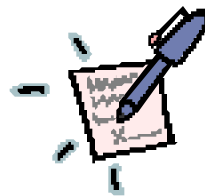

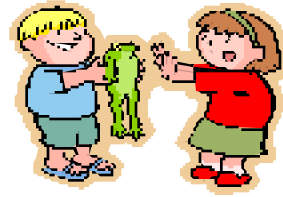

PRESCHOOLERS-TEACHING FOR LIFE

- Self disciplined children know how to behave and can control their behavior themselves. We want them to learn self discipline.
- Discipline and punishment are not the same.

Discipline provides guidance.

Punishment can merely be a penalty for making a mistake. Children rarely, if ever learn correct or acceptable behavior through harsh punishment. Children appreciate guidelines that are constant rather than rules which change regularly.

***TEACHING FOR LIFE BEGINS AT BIRTH:**

- Babies learn trust because they are loved and cared for.
- Toddlers learn it is safe to move around the house because their caregiver has made it safe.
- Young children learn they can try new things and adults will help them work out what is safe to try.

When children play alone they learn about themselves.

When children play with others they learn to make decisions and take risks. Some decisions will be good, some bad. They will also learn that some of their decisions may not be good for others.

*** Parents and caregivers can teach children responsibility for their behavior. By teaching them how and why some behavior can be unsafe, unkind or hurtful we have directed them on the path to being a responsible adult. -submitted by Sandy Richardson, Fairmont

ATTENTION DAY CARE PROVIDERS

A valid child care certificate is the only guarantee that you will be reimbursed through the state of West Virginia for providing child care. Please remember to take special note of the ending date on the child care certificate for your clients. Child care certificates are only valid for 6 months. At the beginning of the 6th month, the clients are mailed a review packet. The clients are to return their review packet, along with verifications needed to determine their eligibility by the 15th of that month. If the client does not respond or if they are no longer eligible, you are mailed a closure notice for that client to take effect at the end of that month. Unless you receive a new certificate from the CCRC, you need to follow the closure notice that was mailed to you. After the client is closed, the state of West Virginia can not reimburse you for your services. Your client will have to pay you privately. If you have any questions, feel free to contact your Family Resource Coordinator at your local Child Care Resource Center office or the Wheeling CCRC at 1-800-585-1603.

Reminder to child care providers: Per Child Care Policy, You are not to expose children to second hand smoke due in part to some of the risks identified below:

The Risks to Children from Second Hand smoke are Widely Acknowledged.

The conclusion that secondhand smoke causes respiratory effects in children is widely shared and virtually undisputed. Even the tobacco industry does not contest these effects in its media and public relations campaign.

EPA estimates that every year, between 150,000 and 300,000 children under 1-1/2 years of age get bronchitis or pneumonia from breathing secondhand tobacco smoke, resulting in thousands of hospitalizations. In children under 18 years of age, secondhand smoke exposure also results in more coughing and wheezing, a small but significant decrease in lung function, and an increase in fluid in the middle ear. Children with asthma have more frequent and more severe asthma attacks because of exposure to secondhand smoke, which is also a risk factor for the onset of asthma in children who did not previously have symptoms.

HEALTH EFFECTS

Secondhand smoke has been classified as a Group A carcinogen by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, a rating used only for substances proven to cause cancer in humans. It is estimated to be responsible annually for approximately 3,000 lung cancer deaths, 35,000 - 62,000 cardiovascular disease deaths, and 2,300 deaths from SIDS. Secondhand smoke is a direct health threat to people who already have heart and lung disease, and increases the risk of serious respiratory disease during the first two years of a child's life. Environmental tobacco smoke contributes to 150,000-300,000 lower respiratory tract infections annually in children less than 18 months of age, resulting in 7,500-15,000 hospitalizations.

Children exposed to secondhand smoke experience many severe health problems. In the first two years of life, babies of parents who smoke at home have a much higher rate of lung diseases such as bronchitis and pneumonia. Several studies have noted an aggravation of asthma in children of smoking parents. A very critical observation is that children of parents who smoke have a slower rate of growth in lung function as the lung matures. It has been suggested that this may lead to increased susceptibility to developing lung disease in adult life.

Studies in progress suggest a relationship between secondhand smoke and cancers other than lung cancer. There is also stronger evidence that secondhand smoke worsens heart disease.

PROTECTING YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY

Here are some ways to protect yourself and your family from secondhand smoke:

- Don't smoke in your home.
- Ask other people not to smoke in your home, especially baby-sitters or others who may care for your children.
- Ask smokers to go outside while they smoke.
- If someone must smoke inside, limit them to rooms where windows can be opened or fans can be used to send the smoke outside.
- Help people who are trying to quit smoking.

The Behavior Support Corner

Family Communications, the producer of Mister Rogers Neighborhood, offers many useful articles and resources at www.fci.org. They are available for Early Care and Preschool Professionals, Elementary Educators and other Professionals, and families. We, at Child Care Resource Center, offer two educational trainings from Family Communications. They are *What Do You Do With The Mad That You Feel?* and *Challenging Behaviors*. Both trainings offer very valuable information for working with children.

What Do You Do With The Mad That You Feel? is a training that reviews how children develop self control, ways that we as child care providers and parents can help children develop self-control, and ways to intervene when children lose control. We must keep in mind when working with children that they do not hit, kick, and/or bite because they are "bad". They do so because they have not yet learned how to control their bodies. This is a developmental issue, not a moral issue. Learning to control ourselves takes time. It is something that even we, as adults, continue to work on.

Listed below are some helpful hints from the *What Do You Do With The Mad That You Feel?* training:

- **Children learn self-control in everyday ways.**
Draw attention to your child when he is waiting successfully, using words, or taking turns.
- **Everyday rules and routines help children develop controls.**
Rules should be simple, clear, and consistent. We all thrive on predictability in our lives.
- **Children get scared when they are so mad they are out of control.**
We, as adults, need to remain calm and be calm with children who are out of control. This helps children to feel safe.
- **When children use words, they are less likely to hit.**
Modeling appropriate ways of using words when we are angry and giving children the right words to use can help them.
- **Children feel good when they are able to stop.**
Encourage a child when she chooses to use her words in place of hitting or kicking. Offer games that use stop and start.
- **Children can express their feelings in ways that do not hurt others.**
Using stories, art work, musical instruments, and many other ways can teach children healthy outlets for angry feelings.

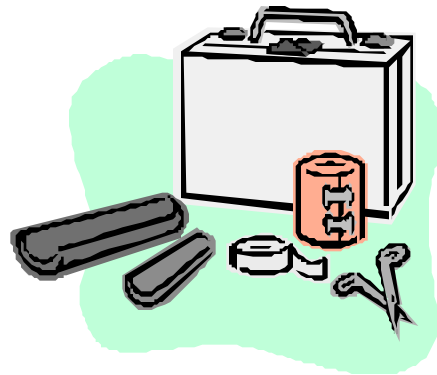
