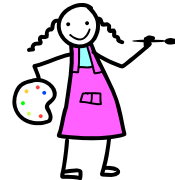
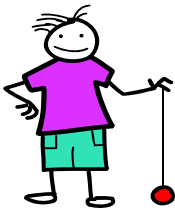

Playground Safety

With summer near, outdoor play environments at child care center's and in-home child care play areas can offer experiences that will enhance children's physical, emotional, social and intellectual development. It is important that center's and private provider's provide opportunities that are meaningful to children.

Children should always be supervised when playing in an outdoor environment. Supervision is more than just watching children. Supervisors should provide support for children's play and know how to respond to emergencies.

Play areas should be age appropriate. With most centers and in-home provider's homes, equipment should be separated. Pre-K, K-2, 3-4 and 5-6 is best.

We all know that when children play, they fall. The goal should be to provide a soft cushion for them to fall onto. Please make sure that you are using the correct surface under and around all equipment. If you are unsure what materials would be best, please contact your licensing agent or monitor.

Reporting child abuse--- it is every ones responsibility..

Reporting child abuse is an important step toward stopping it. Child abuse takes many forms;

- Sexual abuse:
 - *any sexual contact with a child
 - *using a child for sexual films or prostitution
 - *exposing a child to adult sexual activity (through photographs video's etc..)
- Emotional abuse:
 - Can include repeated threats or insults to scare or embarrass a child, or to crush a child's self-esteem. This may also be called verbal abuse.
- Neglect:
 - Can include failing to provide for a child's emotional needs (love, attention, etc.) or medical care, supervision, etc...

Responding to abuse-- if you suspect abuse:

Watch for signs, be approachable, evaluate the situation, and report it...WHEN IN DOUBT REPORT IT...

Be a good listener, be supportive, don't overreact, write it down and then report it...

REMINDER: AS A DAYCARE PROVIDER YOU ARE STATE MANDATED TO REPORT

What to report? As much information as possible... the Childs information, the suspected abuser, type of abuse, the Childs parents, any knowledge you have of past abuse, other witnesses etc....

Never assume someone else will report the abuse... the sooner reported the better and you might have different information to offer.

If you suspect child abuse please take time to make the difference, report it.

Child Abuse Hotline 1-800-352-6513 you can also call 911 or your local WVDHHR office and ask for the worker of the day.

- 1) Ask parents to bring cool clothing to keep on hand
- 2) Keep the children out of the sun during the hottest time of the day
- 3) Check all outside toys and play structures for loose or missing parts
- 4) Walk your fence line and check for loose or missing boards or nails
- 5) Check trees with low large limbs for splits which could fall if pulled on
- 6) Fill water bottles $\frac{3}{4}$ full the night before and freeze. Have the children make a name label put to on their bottles. Place the bottles in a box or on a tray outside and encourage the kids to drink 2-4 bottles of water each day.
- 7) If having trouble getting the kids to drink water, add some lemon or orange slices or make kool-aid or juice ice cubes to add to drinking water
- 8) Serve fruit smoothies, milkshakes or POPCICLES
- 9) Coat everyone well with Sunscreen (Have a signed authorization form prior to application)
- 10) Fire up the sprinkler (if allowed by your licensing agency)
- 11) Keep a small first aid kit outdoors
- 12) Encourage bathroom use before going outdoors to prevent children being unsupervised.
- 13) Create a separate list of outdoor rules i.e. No one leaves the yard, no climbing on the fence, no throwing except for balls, shoes off before reentering the house, etc. Go over the rules the first few days of outdoor play.
- 14) Do not apply bug repellent to the children unless authorized in writing and requested by parents.
- 15) If you have your home sprayed for pests, check to make sure that it is safe for children and pets and confirm what precautions you need to take when the children go outdoors after being sprayed.
- 16) Do not fertilize your plants or lawn during the week, do this on the weekend to allow time for the fertilizer to dissolve.
- 17) Encourage indoors toys to stay in and outdoor toys to stay out.
- 18) Offer fun yet messy activities such as walk chalk, finger-painting and play dough.
- 19) Provide safe outdoor activities such as a child friendly play structure, sand box; ride on toys and balls. Set up sporting stations with a mini basketball hoop or cones for mini soccer games.
- 20) Keep a cellular or cordless phone outdoors so you can be available to parents as needed, while being able to supervise outdoor play at all times.

Toddler Drowning's Happen Quickly and Quietly

With many private and public pools opening up this Memorial Day Weekend, CPSC is strongly advising that homeowners and parents use layers of protection around the pool to prevent children from becoming a drowning victim. Each year, there are about 260 drowning deaths of children younger than 5 in swimming pools, and an estimated 2,725 children are treated in hospital emergency rooms for pool submersion injuries - mostly in residential pools.

CPSC's Chairman Nancy Nord says, "Parents may think that if their child falls in the water, they will hear lots of splashing and screaming, and that they will be able to come to the rescue. Many times, however, children slip under the water silently. Even people near the pool often report hearing nothing out of the ordinary."

To reduce the risk of drowning, CPSC recommends adopting layers of protection, including physical barriers, such as a fence with self-closing, self-latching gates completely surrounding pools, to prevent unsupervised access by young children. If the pool is accessible from the house, use alarms on doors or a power safety cover over the pool.

It is important to always be prepared for an emergency by having rescue equipment and a phone near the pool. Also, all parents who own pools should learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

There is also a growing danger with inflatable or portable pools, which range in size from small kiddie pools to pools up to 4-feet deep and 18-feet wide. Between 2004 and 2006, CPSC received 47 reports of deaths of children related to inflatable pools. Large inflatable pools are relatively inexpensive - large pools with water filters can cost under \$200. These pools are often purchased by consumers without considering the barriers, such as fencing and covers, necessary to protect young children.

In addition to barriers and constant supervision, CPSC offers these tips to help prevent drowning deaths:

- * Since every second counts, always look for a missing child in the pool first. Precious time is often wasted looking for missing children anywhere but in the pool.
- * Don't leave toys and floats in the pool that can attract young children and cause them to fall in the water when they reach for the items.
- * For above-ground and inflatable pools with ladders, remove or secure the ladder when the pool is not in use.
- * Even if children can swim, it doesn't make them drown-proof.

Always supervise children using the pool.
